The Commission has issued **201 annual recreational permits** as of February 28, 2021. There were **176** renewals and **25** new permits. (87.6%/12.4%)

The Commission has issued **540 annual recreational permits** as of December 31, 2020. There were **338** renewals and **202** new permits. (62.6%/37.4%)

It was noted that closures were for the most part insignificant. The largest closure was due to the transplant. Compared to 2019 there were less closures in 2020 primarily due to lack of significant rainfall events.

Mr. Harris noted that Norm Bloom has indicated that he can do another transplant in the Spring once the water warms up.

5. New Business

a. Information learned at 2021 Gathering of Shellfish Commissions

Ms. Mozian, Ms. Higgins, Mr. Walsh and Mr. Harris were in attendance at the Gathering.

Ms. Mozian noted some ideas noted from listening to other Towns for exploring different locations to sell permits. The Commission discussed ideas of where to sell permits since the Dock Shop has closed. These ideas include:

- Explore selling at the Town marinas via Parks and Recreation;
- Set up a table at Ned Dimes Marina to promote sales or at least advertise there;
- Reach out to Fisherman's World in Norwalk to see if they would sell our permits;
- Attendance at the Summer Farmer's Market.

Members discussed the presentation given on the overall effects of climate change on shellfishing.

b. Report on Shellfish Restoration meeting

Ms. Higgins and Mr. Harris attended this meeting.

Ms. Higgins summarized the "story map" that UConn SeaGrant has put together for possible restoration areas. They are establishing sub-groups for both recreational and commercial shellfishing in the areas of public outreach, best management practices, regulatory guidance and data management. It follows the Blue Plan but digs deeper into recreational and commercial shellfishing in the State. It also tracks temperature, salinity and O₂ saturations.

6. Old Business

a. Update on Crabbing Regulations

Ms. Mozian read her notes from discussion with CT DEEP Marine Fisheries. The bottom line is that the Town cannot be more strict than the State but we could dictate what activity takes place on Town property. She noted that the Commission should be mindful that the Town has no jurisdiction below the mean highwater line.

She noted the CT DEEP Fishing Guide has a section on crabbing. She suggested that the Commission could publish the DEEP hotline number to our website for people to report suspected violations of crabbing regulations especially for suspected commercial harvest.

b. Outreach

It was the consensus of the Commission that greater public outreach is necessary both on the Town webpage and on the Town Facebook page.

Ms. Williams indicated she would work with staff on Facebook postings.

7. Other Business

a. Mr. Harris mentioned Mitten Crabs in the Housatonic River. 8 have been collected; 2 of which were female. It was suggested that we should post a warning about the Mitten Crabs to Facebook page.

The March 3, 2021 meeting of the Westport Shellfish Commission adjourned at 7:38 p.m.
